in this book one of the pioneers of twentieth century african history examines the perceptions and responses of africans to european colonialism of the late nineteenth and early twentieth century this edition of boahen s text originally published in 1989 is contextualized in a new foreword by john lonsdale updating some of boahen s findings and interpretations while maintaining that the best totally unambiguous legacy of this republication would surely be the inspiration of a new generation of african scholars locally based as clear minded and outspoken as adu boahen himself

this compilation was inspired by an international symposium held on the legon campus in september 2003 hosted by the codesria african humanities institute programme the symposium had the theme canonical works and continuing innovation in african arts humanities

the essays in this volume demonstrate that on the eastern shores of the mediterranean there were rich variegated and important phenomena associated with the crusades and that a full understanding of the significance of the movement and its impact on both the east and west must take these phenomena into account

this engaging two volume study urges a balance between theoretical and practical sociology applied sociologists adapt theoretical knowledge to actual human situations using it to formulate social policy investigate domestic and international social problems and create a pragmatic sociology of possibility these essays emphasize the close association of applied sociology with altruism identity formation race and ethnicity they evaluate the empirical truths of sociological theories and examine their relevance for contemporary research poverty demographic issues and social policies framed in the context of globalization each chapter of the study provides some workable guidelines for social scientists policymakers planners administrators and social activists the reader is also introduced to the sophisticated research methods employed in the social sciences excessive theorizing is avoided as modern crises precipitated by war terrorism anarchy and poverty are examined in practical and realistic terms

in the rapidly evolving context of contemporary europe many citizens have previous experience of colonial or neo colonial forms of domination this raises questions about the impact of such experiences on the shaping of identities within an environment that is itself constantly evolving how do such people see themselves and their community how are they perceived what effect does this have on their integration into the wider european community this timely volume brings together a series of papers which explore such questions through the discourse relating to those people both self and other generated the originality of this book stems not only from its thematic focus but also from the multi national multi disciplinary background of the contributions which offer new interpretations and analyses in particular within a framework of post colonial and critical discourse theory contributors from across europe and north america bring perspectives from applied linguistics language and literary studies communication studies sociology and social psychology primary texts examined include literature news media film political discourse both written and spoken and original interview data language is

observed both in its usage and for its participatory role in identity formation three different groupings are identified for observation namely 1 migrant diasporas originating from the traditional areas of european colonisation in africa and asia 2 citizens of newer member states of the european union including former soviet satellite states like latvia or aspiring members like turkey and 3 a number of regional groups irish welsh whose relationship with the central government shares neo colonial characteristics the book is intended for all those interested in understanding the factors influencing the rapidly evolving character of europe and its populations and is intended to form a platform for future exploration and research in this area

this history deals with the twenty year period between 1880 and 1900 when virtually all of africa was seized and occupied by the imperial powers of europe eurocentric points of view have dominated the study of this era but in this book one of africa s leading historians reinterprets the colonial experiences from the perspective of the colonized the johns hopkins symposia in comparative history are occasional volumes sponsored by the department of history at the johns hopkins university and the johns hopkins university press comprising original essays by leading scholars in the united states and other countries each volume considers from a comparative perspective an important topic of current historical interest the present volume is the fifteenth its preparation has been assisted by the james s schouler lecture fund

this book examines the evolving representations of the colonial past from the mid 19th century up to decolonization in the 1960s and 70s the so called era of modern imperialism in post war history textbooks from across the world the aim of the book is to examine the evolving outlook of colonial representations in history education and the underpinning explanations for the specific outlook in different former colonizer and colonized countries to be found in collective memory popular historical culture social representations identity building processes and the state of historical knowledge within academia the approach of the book is novel and innovative in different ways first of all given the complexity of the research an original interdisciplinary approach has been implemented which brings together historians history educators and social psychologists to examine representations of colonialism in history education in different countries around the world while drawing on different theoretical frameworks secondly given the interest in the interplay between collective memory popular historical culture social representations and the state of historical knowledge within academia a diachronic approach is implemented examining the evolving representations of the colonial past and connecting them to developments within society at large and academia this will allow for a deeper understanding of the processes under examination thirdly studies from various corners of the world are included in the book more specifically the project includes research from three categories of countries former colonizer countries including england spain italy france portugal and belgium countries having been both colonized and colonizer chile and former colonized countries including zimbabwe malta and mozambique this selection allows pairing up the countries under review as former colonizing colonized ones for instance portugal mozambique united kingdom malta allowing for an in depth comparison between the countries involved before reaching the research core three introductory chapters outline three general issues the book starts with addressing the different approaches and epistemological underpinnings history and social psychology as academic disciplines hold in a second chapter evolutions within international academic colonial historiography are analyzed with a special focus on the recent development of new imperial history a third chapter analyses history textbooks as cultural tools and political means of transmitting historical knowledge and representations across generations the next ten chapters form the core of the book in which evolving representations of colonial history from mid 19th century until decolonization in the 1960s and 1970s are examined explained and reflected upon for the above mentioned countries this is done through a history textbook analysis in a diachronic perspective for some countries the analysis dates back to textbooks published after the second world war for other countries the focus will be more limited in time the research presented is done by historians and history educators as well as by social psychologists in a concluding chapter an overall overview is presented in which similarities and differences throughout the case studies are identified interpreted and reflected upon
