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this anthology of materials by and about elena garro includes translations of two of her one act plays and several essays that explore her theatrical and narrative pieces also presented are a personal interview and a chronology of her life by her own account

winner 2024 aldo and jeanne scaglione publication award for a manuscript in italian literary studies modern languages association introduces a way to study migration that privileges literary analysis over and against sociological data and insists on the importance of culture in the production of political identities this book argues that italians first became racialized as white in são paulo brazil at the turn of the twentieth century whereas italians in the united states struggled with xenophobia and were often not fully acknowledged as white in são paulo due to a series of social economic and cultural factors italians became closely associated with ideas of whiteness modernization and civilization this book brings to light how the overlooked experiences of italians in brazil complicate conventional narratives about the racial ambiguity and oppression of italians in the americas on the one hand and the conflation of italians with cultural and economic backwardness in europe on the other in the book close readings of a wide array of texts the travel writings of gina lombroso ferrero the short stories of antônio de alcântara machado the columns of josé correia leite the political essays of miguel reale and the memoirs of zélia gattai trace a new world italian discourse or the overlapping narratives about italian racial economic and cultural superiority that constructed and maintained italians status as a model minority in são paulo these discursive practices represent essential antecedents to the racial nationalism that reared its ugly head in italy throughout the twentieth century and remain central to contemporary debates about national identity in the italian public sphere the italian colony of são paulo race class and cultural capital in brazil is available from the publisher on an open access basis

this volume of essays explores what it is that has brought marginalized and often exiled writers seen as treacherous alienated and or queer by their societies and nations together by way of paris spanning from the inter war period of the late 1920s to the present millennium this volume considers many seminal questions that have influenced and continue to shape the realm of exiled writers who have sought refuge in paris in order to write additionally the volume s essays seek to define alienation and marginalization as not solely subscribing to any

single denominator sexual preference gender or nationality but rather as shared modes of being that allow authors to explore what it is to write from abroad in a place that is foreign yet freed of the constrictions of one's home space what makes paris a particularly fruitful space that has allowed these authors and their writings to cross national ethnic racial religious and linguistic boundaries for over a century what is it that brings together writers such as moroccan abdellah taïa americans james baldwin richard wright and most recently ta nehisi coates and shay youngblood algerian nabile farès franco algerian leila sebbar canadian nancy huston french jean genet and french vietnamese linda lê how do their representations and understanding of transgression and marginalization transcend national linguistic and ethnic boundaries leading ultimately to revolution both literary and literal how does their writing help us to trace the history of paris as a literary and artistic capital that has been useful for authors exploration of the self race and home country these are but a few of the many questions explored in this volume this book relies on an inherently intersectional approach which is not based in reified identities whether they be lgbt postcolonial ethnic national or linguistic instead we posit that for example queer theory and a politics of difference i can help us investigate the dynamics of these multiple identity positions and hence provide a broader understanding of the lived experiences of these writers and perhaps their readers from the early 1940s to the present

the first in depth study in english to analyze post utopian historical novels written during and in the wake of brutal latin american dictatorships and authoritarian regimes during neoliberal reforms in the 1980s and 1990s murder repression and exile had reduced the number of intellectuals and leftists and many succumbed to or were coopted by market forces and ideologies the opposition to the economic violence of neoliberal projects lacked a united front and feasible alternatives to the contemporary order no longer seemed to exist in this context some latin american literary intellectuals penned post utopian historical novels as a means to reconstruct memory of significant moments in national history through the distortion and superimposition of distinct genres within the narratives authors of post utopian historical novels incorporated literary cultural and political traditions to expose contemporary challenges that were rooted in unresolved past conflicts in anything but novel jennie irene daniels closely examines four post utopian novels césar aira's *ema la cautiva* rubem fonseca's *o selvagem da Ópera* josé miguel varas's *el correo de bagdad* and santiago páez's *crónicas del breve reino* to make their contributions more accessible and to synthesize and highlight the literary and social interventions they make although the countries the novels focus on argentina brazil chile and ecuador differ widely in politics regime changes historical precedents geography and demographics the development of a shared subgenre among the literary elite suggests a common experience and interpretation of contemporary events across latin america these novels complement one another extending shared themes and critiques daniels argues the novels demonstrate that alternatives exist to neoliberalism even in times when it appears there are none another contribution of these

novels is their repositioning of the latin american literary intellectuals who have advocated for the marginalized in their societies their work has opened new avenues and developed previous lines of research in feminist queer and ethnic studies and for nonwhite nonmale writers

although published as part of a series on brazilian studies central to this collection are not the concepts of nation or nationhood but those of transnational networks and cross cultural exchanges the concept of nation is of limited value to account for the periodical print culture as a global phenomenon marked by transnational movements such as those involving capital flows commodities people ideas and editorial models in this vein what these chapters explore is not so much the concept of influence which often plays a central role in eurocentric analyses but those of circulation and interaction the notion of circulation here emphasised is more appropriate to the study of cultural exchanges focusing on the movements of and engagements with ideas and concepts as well as the appropriated models and the people involved in the publication and consumption of magazines what the reader will find in these essays are analysis of numerous processes of transnational cultural negotiations

sixteen original essays on women writers from mexico guatemala honduras costa rica colombia ecuador uruguay argentina and brazil are gathered in this book each establishes the relationship between the biography of the subject and her literary production some of these writers like nobel prize winner gabriela mistral elena poniatowska and victoria ocampo are well known others are still largely undiscovered all of them defy the limits imposed upon them by society and all have been able to find freedom through creative imagination all the writers included here are vitally concerned with the problems women face in latin america children and mothers are the central focus of their lives and of many of their writings these writers have participated in essential ways in the history of their respective countries and in the intellectual history of latin america and at the same time their greatest contribution has been in the sharing of the private details of personal stories their own and others in the strong connections that many of them have had with each other marjorie agosin sees a culture of sisterhood

the chapters in this volume are contributions toward a reassessment of contemporary latin american writing and are based on the strategy of willfully imposing a perspective at radical variance with the existing bibliography on the subject by eschewing the approach of a historical overview by focusing on works that are not predominantly available in english translation by choosing categories that do not evoke prevailing literary norms and by concentrating on writings that rashly juxtapose well known works with relatively unknown ones the author hopes both to suggest a more comprehensive although necessarily fragmentary panorama of latin american fiction and to suggest a consideration of works on the basis of criteria other than their international stature or the extent to which they represent spanish language variations on modalities whose importance has been established by french or american example

chicano studies this anthology brings together twenty ground breaking essays from *aztlan* a journal of chicano studies the journal of record in the field spanning thirty years these essays shaped the development of chicano studies and testify to its broad disciplinary and thematic range the anthology documents four major strands in chicano scholarship and is divided into sections accordingly decolonizing the territory performing politics configuring identities and remapping the world each section is introduced by one of the co editors chon a noriega eric r avila karen mary davalos chela sandoval and rafael perez torres

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
