the plays of euripides have stimulated audiences since the fifth century bc this volume containing phoenician women bacchae iphigenia at aulis orestes and rhesus completes the new editions of euripides in penguin classics features a general introduction individual prefaces to each play chronology notes bibliography and glossary

more complex than straightforward notions of the dionsyiac euripides dionysus blurs the dividing line between many of the fundamental categories of greek life male and female greek and barbarian divine and human this text explores his place in athenian religion detailing what euripides makes of him in the play

euripides bacchae is one of the most widely read and performed greek tragedies a story of implacable divine vengeance it skilfully transforms earlier currents of literature and myth and its formative influence on modern ideas of greek tragedy and religion is unparalleled this up to date edition offers a detailed literary and cultural analysis the wide ranging

introduction discusses such issues as the psychological and anthropological aspects of dionysiac ritual the god s ability to blur gender boundaries his particular connection to dramatic role playing and the interaction of belief and practice in greek religion the commentary s notes on language and style are intended to make the play fully accessible to students of greek at all levels while the edition as a whole is designed for anyone with an interest in greek tragedy or cultural history

in his play bacchae euripides chooses as his central figure the god who crosses the boundaries among god man and beast between reality and imagination and between art and madness in so doing he explores what in tragedy is able to reach beyond the social ritual and historical context from which tragedy itself rises charles segal s reading of euripides bacchae builds gradually from concrete details of cult setting and imagery to the work s implications for the nature of myth language and theater this volume presents the argument that the dionysiac poetics of the play characterize a world view and an art form that can admit logical contradictions and hold them in suspension

euripides bacchae is the magnum opus of the ancient world s most popular dramatist and the most modern perhaps postmodern of greek tragedies twentieth century poets and playwrights have often turned their hand to bacchae leaving the play with an especially rich and varied translation history it has also been subjected to several fashions of criticism and interpretation over the years all reflected in influencing and influenced by translation the gentle jealous god introduces the play and surveys its wider reception examines a selection of english translations from the early 20th century to the early 21st setting them in their social intellectual and cultural context and argues finally that dionysus and bacchae remain potent cultural symbols even now simon perris presents a fascinating cultural history of one of world theatre s landmark classics he explores the reception of dionysus bacchae and the classical ideal in a violent and turmoil ridden era and he demonstrates by example that translation matters or should matter to readers writers actors directors students and scholars of ancient drama

bacchae is one of the most troubling yet intriguing of greek tragedies written during euripides self imposed exile in macedonia it tells of the brutal murder and dismemberment of pentheus by his mother and aunts who driven temporarily insane have joined the bacchae devotees of the god dionysus or bacchus the startling plot driven by dionysus desire to punish his family for refusing to accept his divinity and culminating in the excruciating pathos of a mother s realization that she has killed her son has held audiences transfixed since its original performance when it won first prize it is one of the most performed and studied plays in the greek tragic corpus with a strong history of reception down to the present day this collection of essays by eminent academics gathered from across the globe explores the themes staging and reception of the play with essays on the characters dionysus and pentheus the role of the chorus of bacchae key themes such as revenge women and religion and the historical and literary contexts of the play the essays are accompanied by david stuttard s english translation which is performer friendly accessible and closely accurate to the original

euripides bacchae the last of the surviving greek tragedies was first performed in 405 bc in the annual competition for tragic drama where it won first prize it has remained one of the most frequently performed greek tragedies ever since and one of t

regarded by many as euripides masterpiece bakkhai is a powerful examination of religious ecstasy and the resistance to it a call for moderation it rejects the temptation of pure reason as well as pure sensuality and is a staple of greek tragedy representing in structure and thematics an exemplary model of the classic tragic elements disguised as a young holy man the god bacchus arrives in greece from asia proclaiming his godhood and preaching his orgiastic religion he expects to be embraced in thebes but the theban king pentheus forbids his people to worship him and tries to have him arrested enraged bacchus drives pentheus mad and leads him to the mountains where pentheus own mother agave and the women of thebes tear him to pieces in a bacchic frenzy gibbons a prize winning poet and segal a renowned classicist offer a skilled new translation of this central text of greek tragedy

the bacchae of euripides the bacchae is an ancient greek tragedy written by the athenian playwright euripides during his final years in macedonia at the court of archelaus i of macedon it premiered posthumously at the theatre of dionysus in 405 bc as part of a tetralogy that also included iphigeneia at aulis and alcmaeon in corinth and which euripides son or nephew are assumed to have directed it won first prize in the city dionysia festival competition the bacchae is concerned with two opposite sides of human nature the rational and civilized side which is represented by the character of pentheus the king of thebes and the instinctive side which is represented by dionysus this side is sensual without analysis it feels a connection between man and beast and it is a potential source of divinity and spiritual power in euripides plays the gods represent various human qualities allowing the audience to grapple with considerations of the human condition the bacchae seems to be saying that it is perilous to deny or ignore the human desire for dionysian experience those who are open to the experience will find spiritual power and those who suppress or repress the desire in themselves or others will transform it into a destructive force

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
