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the latest book in a series that seeks to illuminate francis bacon s art and motivations and open up fresh and stimulating ways of understanding his paintings francis bacon was one of the most important artists of the twentieth century his works continue to puzzle and unnerve viewers raising complex questions about their meaning over recent decades two theoretical approaches to bacon s work have come to hold sway first that bacon is an existential painter depicting an absurd and godless world and second that he is an antirepresentational painter whose primary aim is to expose his work directly to the spectator s nervous system francis bacon draws together some of today s leading philosophers and psychoanalytic critics to go beyond established readings of bacon and open up radically new ways of thinking about his art the essays bring

bacon into dialogue with figures such as aristotle georg hegel sigmund freud jacques lacan theodor adorno and martin heidegger and situate his work in the broader contexts of modernism and modernity the result is a timely and thought provoking collection that will be essential reading for anyone interested in bacon modern art and contemporary aesthetics

this book places the contribution of psychoanalysis to the understanding of art within a philosophical framework and seeks to show by argument and example the potential and unrealized power of psychoanalytic theory for a philosophy of art and culture

the highly arcane wisdom produced by the french psychoanalyst jacques lacan is either endlessly regurgitated and recited as holy writ by his numerous acolytes or radically dismissed as unpalatable nonsense by his equally countless detractors contrary to these common strictly antagonistic yet uniformly uncritical practices this book offers a meticulous critique of some key theoretical and clinical aspects of lacan s expansive oeuvre testing their consistency examining their implications and investigating their significance in nine interrelated chapters the book highlights both the flaws and the strengths of lacan s ideas in areas of investigation that are as crucial as they are contentious within as well as outside psychoanalysis drawing on a vast range of source materials including many unpublished archival documents it teases out controversial issues such as money organisational failure and lighthearted gay thinking and it relies on the highest standards of scholarly excellence to develop its arguments at the same time the book does not presuppose any prior knowledge of lacanian psychoanalysis on the part of the reader but allows its readership to indulge in the joys of in depth critical analysis trans disciplinary creative thinking and persistent questioning this book will appeal to researchers and students alike in psychoanalytic studies and philosophy as well as all those interested in french theory and the history of ideas

this title was first published in 2001 drawing on recent work in the philosophy of psychoanalysis and on considerations of the nature of psychoanalytic theory itself this book reveals new possibilities which psychoanalysis offers for an understanding of the mind more broadly the subject of mental states and its relation to the world entailing a re examination of an approach embedded in the work of certain continental thinkers notably heidegger and hegel the connections between philosophy and psychoanalysis presented in this book represent a fresh departure linking kleinian notions of an inner world of unconscious phantasy to philosophical conceptions of non linguistic meaning whose significance for the psychoanalytic understanding of subjectivity has been hitherto overlooked snelling argues that psychoanalysis demands a significant place in our philosophical understanding of ourselves

this study offers a new perspective on the object represented by art specifically by art that succeeds to create in its receiver a sense of the real a sense of approximating the true nature of the represented object that lies outside the artwork the object that cannot be accessed through a concept a meaning or a sign the thing in itself is generally rejected by philosophy as being outside the realm of its concerns this rejection is

surveyed in a number of philosophical discussions from Kant to Hilary Putnam turning to the psychoanalytic object an object inexhaustible in terms of its external existence or in terms of its conceptual status or meaning the object is always suppressed partly known inaccessible another notion of the object the real is suggested as what can neither be contained in language nor reduced to a linguistic referent this solution does not lead away from philosophical interests but rather exposes this dilemma about the object of representation as fundamentally philosophical cases of artistic realism discussed range from perspective painting to abstract art from tragedies to the literary representation of minds

Why do painters paint obviously there are numerous possible reasons they paint to create images for others enjoyment to solve visual problems to convey ideas and to contribute to a rich artistic tradition this book argues that there is yet another crucially important but often overlooked reason painters paint to feel they paint because it enables them to experience special feelings such as being absorbed in creative play and connected to something vitally significant painting may even transform the painter's whole sense of being thus painting is not only about producing art communicating content and so on but also about setting up and inhabiting an experiential space wherein highly valued feelings are interactively enabled and supported this book investigates how and why this happens by combining psychoanalytical theorization on creativity with philosophical thinking on affectivity it focuses on creative experience itself and illuminates the psychological mechanisms and dynamics that underlie the affects at stake painters own descriptions of how they feel at work are used throughout to give an accurate true to life portrayal of the experience of painting the strength of the book lies in its open minded yet critical integration of contemporary psychoanalytic and philosophical thinking and in its truthfulness to painters experiential descriptions of the painterly process on the whole it enriches our understanding of artistic creativity and sheds more light on how and why we come to feel the things we do as such the book will appeal to philosophers psychoanalysts and art researchers alike

art death and lacanian psychoanalysis examines the relationship between art and death from the perspective of lacanian psychoanalysis it takes a unique approach to the topic by making explicit reference to the death drive as manifest in theories of art and in artworks freud's treatment of death focuses not on the moment of biological extinction but on the recurrent moments in life which he called the death drive or the compulsion to repeat the return precisely of what is most unbearable for the subject surprisingly in some of its manifestations this painful repetition turns out to be invigorating it is this invigorating repetition that is the main concern of this book which demonstrates the presence of its manifestations in painting and literature and in the theoretical discourse concerning them from the dawn of western culture to the present after unfolding the psychoanalytical and philosophical underpinnings for the return of the death drive as invigorating repetition in the sphere of the arts the authors examine various aspects of this repetition through the works of gerhard richter jeff wall and contemporary israeli artists deganit berest and yitzhak livneh as well as through the writings of virginia woolf and james joyce first to articulate the stimulating aspect of the death drive in its relation to the arts and the conception of art as a varied repetition beyond a limit art death and lacanian psychoanalysis will be indispensable to psychoanalysts scholars of art theory and aesthetics and those studying at the intersection of art and psychoanalysis

whether psychoanalysis can in fact add to our understanding of art has long been a source of contention among art historians and psychoanalysts leonardo psychoanalysis and art history is the latest round of a lively intellectual debate that has taken place between the two disciplines over the decades

while philosophy and psychoanalysis privilege language and conceptual distinctions and mistrust the image the philosopher and psychoanalyst julia kristeva recognizes the power of art and the imagination to unblock important sources of meaning she also appreciates the process through which creative acts counteract and transform feelings of violence and depression reviewing kristeva s corpus elaine p miller considers the intellectual s aesthetic idea and thought specular in their capacity to reshape depressive thought on both the individual and cultural level she revisits kristeva s reading of walter benjamin with reference to melancholic art and the imagination s allegorical structure her analysis of byzantine iconoclasm in relation to freud s psychoanalytic theory of negation and hegel s dialectical negativity her understanding of proust as an exemplary practitioner of sublimation her rereading of kant and arendt in terms of art as an intentional lingering with foreignness and her argument that forgiveness is both a philosophical and psychoanalytic method of transcending a stuck existence focusing on specific artworks that illustrate kristeva s ideas from ancient greek tragedy to early photography contemporary installation art and film miller positions creative acts as a form of spiritual inoculation against the violence of our society and its discouragement of thought and reflection
