rehabilitation psychology is one of the fastest growing fields in applied psychology in this book the editor has successfully brought together a range of well established international and experienced researchers and practitioners to provide a guide to best practice clinical management and the wider professional themes and issues

with chronic health problems rising steadily rehabilitation is expected to escalate to a major health care concern this book is a ground breaking resource that captures the depth of this changing field by combining the traditional areas in rehabilitation such as spinal cord injury brain injury and limb amputation with new areas of expertise such as neuroimaging functional outcomes and new models of rehabilitation since its emergence as a separate field over 40 years ago rehabilitation psychology has expanded to include numerous disciplines accordingly the handbook s coverage runs the gamut from clinical psychology and neuropsychology to social psychology and health policy and includes a list of acronyms and resources as well as a glossary as scientist practitioners chapter

we have provided the reader with a resource for applied ethical decision making for use in clinical educational and research settings the rehabilitation psychologist using this book will have a choice of utilizing a quick reference guide including pro con positions regarding possible resolutions and a tabular summary of the varied case examples presented or making use of more detailed discussion of the ethical concepts pertinent to each case the most important aspect of this book is inclusion of psycho social context for each case this critical factor allows the reader to understand the flow of events and other factors influencing the actions of the key stakeholders thereby facilitating the ethical decision making process the mix of case examples is intentionally broad based including ample clinical practice situations along with challenges found in educational and research settings there is also variety among the case examples with two detailed scenarios in each chapter along with two briefer learning exercises with focused summaries the reader is challenged to analyze each case and compare the results with the preferred resolution proposed by the authors finally at the end of the book the reader has access to a list of ethics relevant reading resources these resources are divided into categorical domains that will assist with literature searches and further research into applied ethics the authors trust that this book will serve as a preparatory experience for those psychologists studying for the rehabilitation psychology specialty board exam as well as trainees and clinicians at all levels who desire an applied approach to utilizing the apa ethics code as an invaluable guide to everyday professional practice

disability is often erroneously understood exclusively as a quality of disabled people a fact that ignores the role of the environment

both real and perceived and importantly the attitudes and actions of nondisabled individuals the seven foundational principles of rehabilitation psychology represent a distillation of key ideas and concepts that aid disabled individuals while also educating their nondisabled allies

despite medical technological advances the major killers with which we must currently contend have remained essentially the same for the past few decades stroke cancer and heart disease together account for the vast majority of deaths in the united states in addition due to improved medical care many americans who would previously have died now survive these disorders necessitating that they receive appropriate rehabilitation efforts one result of our own medical advances is that we must now accept the high costs associated with providing quality care to individuals who develop one of these problems and we must avail ourselves to assist of afflicted individuals families despite the relative stability of causes of death and disability the health care field is currently experiencing tremendous pressures both from professionals with in the field who desire more and better technology than is currently available and from the public and other payers of health care e g insurance companies who seek an end to increasing health care

costs these pressures along with an increased emphasis on providing evidence of cost effectiveness and quality assurance are substantially changing the way that health care professionals perform their jobs

rehabilitation psychologists have long argued that situational constraints e g missing ramps lack of braille signage nondisabled

people's attitudes create greater social barriers and behavioral restrictions for people with disabilities (PWDs) than do the disabilities themselves. In other words, as social psychologist Kurt Lewin argued, situational factors including the perceptions and actions of other people often have greater impact on the experience of disability than do the personal qualities of PWDs themselves. Thus, the experience of disability is shaped by a variety of psychosocial forces and factors, some of which enhance while others hinder daily living. For adequate understanding and to plan constructive interventions, psychological science must attend to how the disabled person and the situation interact with one another. Understanding the experience of disability. Perspectives from social and rehabilitation psychology. This is an edited book containing chapters written by social and rehabilitation psychologists who study how social psychological theory can inform our understanding of the experience of disability and rehabilitation. Chapters are arranged topically into four sections: established areas of inquiry (e.g., stigma, social biases, stereotyping), mainstream topics (e.g., women, culture, and race, aging), emerging issues (e.g., implicit attitudes, family and parenting issues, positive psychology, and issues of injustice), and advocacy and social policy (e.g., perceived injustice, disability advocacy, policy implications). Besides informing advanced undergraduate and graduate students and professional researchers/practitioners, audiences, the book will help families and caregivers of PWDs, policy makers, and PWDs themselves understand the social psychological processes linked to disability.

The rehabilitation psychology literature suggests many rehabilitation psychologists are not adequately trained for work in rehabilitation (Shontz & Wright, 1980) and that sound preparation can only be acquired through a rehabilitation psychology doctoral program (Golden, 1984). However, there are few published research studies to support this position. The purpose of this study was to determine whether there are significant differences in objective and subjective professional characteristics of rehabilitation psychologists trained in clinical counseling and rehabilitation psychology doctoral programs. Eleven of the 26 research questions of this study indicated

significant differences in objective and subjective professional characteristics of rehabilitation psychologists among respondents trained in clinical counseling and rehabilitation psychology doctoral programs however none of the 11 significant differences obtained indicate or suggest respondents trained in clinical counseling or rehabilitation psychology doctoral programs are limited in their effectiveness as rehabilitation psychologists the findings of this study indicate there are no significant differences in the perceived practitioner competencies primary work settings major functions theoretical orientations and primary goals for patients or clients among respondents trained in clinical counseling or rehabilitation psychology doctoral programs it appears that the skills and knowledge required to function effectively as a rehabilitation psychologist can be acquired during the internship or through work experience it is the conclusion of this study that rehabilitation psychologists trained in clinical counseling or rehabilitation psychology doctoral programs appear to be adequately prepared for work in rehabilitation however the results of this study must be cautiously interpreted due to the primary reliance on self evaluations the findings suggest that respondents from each type of doctoral program have unique strengths and contributions to offer the field of rehabilitation it is the recommendation of this study that each type of doctoral program training persons interested in rehabilitation psychology provide such students with practicum experience in a rehabilitation setting and exposure to relevant rehabilitation psychology coursework

an increasing number of psychologists who were trained in clinical psychology health psychology or another specialty are gravitating toward rehabilitation psychology but many of them have little or no experience with rehabilitation populations with the explosion of interest in traumatic brain injury tbi many neuropsychologists are taking jobs in rehabilitation settings that treat people with tbi but also care for persons with the array of other disabling conditions such as spinal cord injury stroke ms and amputation

this is the first book devoted to the topic of validity assessment in rehabilitation contexts and is written by two board certified psychologists with extensive experience in clinical neuropsychology and rehabilitation psychology

when contemplating the broad field of critical care and all of its complexities rehabilitation and psychology practice is not likely among the top ten services that clinicians patients or the public think of and rightly so the vast majority of patients who require intensive care arrive at death's door and many linger in a limbo like space somewhere between life and the afterlife the primary focus at this juncture is often on pressing matters such as reestablishing and stabilizing basic bodily functions optimizing life saving machine settings and deciding who does and does not need additional urgent interventions still just beneath the surface of this fascinating multilayered environment the need for psychologists and rehabilitation oriented clinicians is everywhere in large part because intensive care stands among the most emotionally intense and physically taxing hospital based settings for everyone involved patients families caregivers and staff alike despite this recognition that psychologists and rehabilitation oriented professionals could and should be more integrated within the critical care team is uncommon in fact it can be argued that some european countries are ahead of the united states us in this regard agarwala ahmed patil 2011 andreoli novaes karam knobel 2001 jackson jutte 2016 peris et al 2011 sukanarat greer brett williamson 2007 tan brett stokes 2009 van den born van zanten dongelmans dettling ihnenfeldt vink van der schaaf 2016 fortunately there are growing integrative trends in the us in 2010 a conference was convened by the society of critical care medicine sccm with broad goals to inform stakeholders about the multiple long term consequences of critical illness e g postintensive care syndrome pics and initiate
