as the son of ww ii era parents journalist joe sacco was heavily affected by the plight of people around the world forced from their homes while under foreign occupation his palestine series of comic books won the national book award in 1996 and his safe area gorazde and the fixer have earned him a unique place in the world of comics and graphic novels this book is an intriguing look at a popular writer and includes numerous examples of his color and black and white illustrations

memories are not static or frozen remaining in particular sites or places within and belonging to particular groups cultures or nations rather memory travels broadly speaking memory has travelled because of the demographic displacements brought about by modernity s extremes slavery colonialism ethnic cleansing and genocide and also because of the trade travel and migration made possible by globalisation whether social movement is violent exilic migratory emancipatory or oppressive it is accompanied by memory with the movement of people memories of modernity s histories and postmodern legacies meet correspond and often become mutually constitutive even where memories compete with each other for cultural dominance mutual dialogue and recognition is implicit if not explicit memories travel through and across cultures and national boundaries a process increasingly facilitated by mass media technologies this collection explores a range of case studies of transcultural memory as well as theorising the mobility of memory as it travels it was originally published as a special issue of the journal parallax

follow award winning cartoon journalist joe sacco on one of the most dangerous beats of all rock n roll the centerpiece of the book is an expanded version of in the company of long hair the early 90s graphic novelette sacco created on the subject of his raucous european tour with the punk band the miracle workers long hair appears here for the first time in an expanded version with an added 15 page section of his original sketches and notes from the time and a bound in cd featuring an excerpt from the miracle workers live shows including a blasting version of the iggy pop classic i got a right as for the rest of the book sacco turns his pitiless pen on all strata of rock n roll from old rockers two stories on the rolling stones to new from salacious gossip to how to woodstock in your own home from portraits of typical rock creatures record producer the musician who wanted to save the world the rock journalist to self deprecating autobiographical stories

range of his award winning work from his early comics stories as well as his groundbreaking journalism palestine 1993 and safe area to goražde 2000 to footnotes in gaza 2009 and his most recent book the great war 2013 a graphic history of world war i first in the series critical approaches to comics artists this edited volume explores sacco s comics journalism and features established and emerging scholars from comics studies cultural studies geography literary studies political science and communication studies sacco s work has already found a place in some of the foundational scholarship in comics studies and this book solidifies his role as one of the most important comics artists today sections focus on how sacco s comics journalism critiques and employs the standard of objectivity in mainstream reporting what aesthetic principles and approaches to lived experience can be found in his comics how sacco employs the space of the comics page to map history and war and the ways that his comics function in the classroom and as human rights activism the comics of joe sacco offers definitive exciting approaches to some of the most important and necessary comics today by one of the most acclaimed journalist artists of our time

frames and framing in documentary comics explores how graphic narratives reframe global crises while also interrogating practices of fact finding an analog print phenomenon in an era shaped by digitalization documentary comics formulates a distinct counterapproach to conventional journalism in what ways are facts being presented and framed what is documentary honesty in a world of fake news and post truth politics how can the stories of marginalized peoples and neglected crises be told the author investigates documentary comics in its unique relationship to framing graphic narratives are essentially shaped by a reciprocal relationship between the manifest frames on the page and the attention to the cognitive frames that they generate to account for both the textuality of comics and its strategic use as rhetoric the author combines theories of framing analysis and cognitive narratology with comics studies and its attention toward the medium s visual frames

first runner up for the 2019 ray and pat browne award for the best edited collection in popular and american culture cultures of war in graphic novels examines the representation of small scale and often less acknowledged conflicts from

around the world and throughout history the contributors look at an array of graphic novels about conflicts such as the boxer rebellion 1899 1901 the irish struggle for national independence 1916 1998 the falkland war 1982 the bosnian war 1992 1995 the rwandan genocide 1994 the israel lebanon war 2006 and the war on terror 2001 the book explores the multi layered relation between the graphic novel as a popular medium and war as a pivotal recurring experience in human history the focus on largely overlooked small scale conflicts contributes not only to advance our understanding of graphic novels about war and the cultural aspects of war as reflected in graphic novels but also our sense of the early twenty first century in which popular media and limited conflicts have become closely interrelated

contributions by dorian I alexander chris bishop david budgen lewis call lillian céspedes gonzález dominic davies sean eedy adam fotos michael goodrum simon gough david hitchcock robert hutton iain a macinnes małgorzata olsza philip smith edward still and jing zhang in drawing the past volume 2 comics and the historical imagination in the world contributors seek to examine the many ways in which history worldwide has been explored and re represented through comics and how history is a complex construction of imagination reality and manipulation through a close analysis of such works as v for vendetta maus and persepolis this volume contends that comics are a form of mediation between sources both primary and secondary and the reader historical comics are not drawn from memory but offer a nonliteral interpretation of an object re constructed in the creator's mind indeed when it comes to history stretching the limits of the imagination only serves to aid in our understanding of the past and through that understanding shape ourselves and our futures this volume the second in a two volume series is divided into three sections history and form historical trauma and mythic histories the first section considers the relationship between history and the comic book form the second section engages academic scholarship on comics that has recurring interest in the representation of war and trauma the final section looks at mythic histories that consciously play with events that did not occur but nonetheless inflect our understanding of history contributors to the volume also explore questions of diversity and relationality addressing differences between nations and the cultural historical and economic threads that bind them together however loosely and however much those bonds

might chafe together both volumes bring together a range of different approaches to diverse material and feature remarkable scholars from all over the world

named a best book of 2020 by the new york times the guardian the brooklyn rail the globe and mail pop matters comics beat and publishers weekly from the heir to r crumb and art spiegelman the economist a masterful work of comics journalism about indigenous north america resource extraction and our debt to the natural world the dene have lived in the vast mackenzie river valley since time immemorial by their account to the dene the land owns them not the other way around and it is central to their livelihood and very way of being but the subarctic canadian northwest territories are home to valuable resources including oil gas and diamonds with mining came jobs and investment but also road building pipelines and toxic waste which scarred the landscape and alcohol drugs and debt which deformed a way of life in paying the land joe sacco travels the frozen north to reveal a people in conflict over the costs and benefits of development the mining boom is only the latest assault on indigenous culture sacco recounts the shattering impact of a residential school system that aimed to remove the indian from the child the destructive process that drove the dene from the bush into settlements and turned them into wage laborers the government land claims stacked against the dene nation and their uphill efforts to revive a wounded culture against a vast and gorgeous landscape that dwarfs all human scale paying the land lends an ear to trappers and chiefs activists and priests to tell a sweeping story about money dependency loss and culture recounted in stunning visual detail by one of the greatest cartoonists alive

collects illustrated satirical stories about the author s life war politics and sex including the tales voyage to the end of the library and when good bombs happen to bad people

from our greatest living comics journalist minneapolis star tribune a revelatory investigation of deadly sectarian riots in uttar pradesh india that explores the mechanics dynamics mythologies uses and abuses of political violence everywhere compared to other episodes of lethal indian communal violence the clashes in uttar pradesh in 2013 the muzaffarnagar

riot were a relatively small scale affair some scores of people were killed and several tens of thousands displaced it had happened before and will probably happen again hindus and muslims armed with guns and swords riled up by vitriolic rhetoric and a tangle of accusations turn on one another the truth fragments along religious lines both in the lead up to the rampage and in its bloody aftermath in the once and future riot joe sacco immerses himself in uttar pradesh speaking to government officials political leaders village chiefs and especially the victims who were mostly landless peasants in a quest to understand this riot as an archetype of political violence in the process he probes the role of savagery in a democracy the power of crowds rather than leaders to influence the course of events the collision of competing narratives and the accounts that perpetrators construct to explain away their participation in bloodshed hailed as the heir to r crumb and art spiegelman economist sacco has chronicled the urgent histories that define the world around us from the great war to gaza here he turns his masterful visual reportage to a story that is specific to india but with implications and resonance for all precarious multiethnic multiracial societies everywhere

collects top selected war comics of the twentieth and twenty first centuries in an anthology that is complemented by interviews with leading genre artists writers and designers

the blessing of an inherently interpretive medium like comics is that it hasn t allowed me to make a virtue of dispassion for good or for ill the comics medium is adamant and it has forced me to make choices in my view that is part of its message from the preface by joe sacco over the past decade joe sacco has increasingly turned to short form com ics journalism to report from conflict zones around the world collected here for the first time sacco s darkly funny revealing reportage confirms his standing as one of the foremost international correspondents working today journalism takes readers from the smuggling tunnels of gaza to war crimes trials in the hague from the lives of india s untouchables to the ordeal of sub saharan refugees washed up on the shores of malta sacco also confronts the misery and absurdity of the war in iraq including the darkest chapter in recent american history the torture of detainees vividly depicting sacco s own interactions with the people he meets the stories in this remarkable collection argue for the essential truth in comics

reportage an inevitably subjective journalistic endeavour among sacco s most mature and accomplished work journalism demonstrates the power of a great comics artist to chronicle lived experience with a force that often eludes other media

this penultimate work in john lent s series of bibliographies on comic art gathers together an astounding array of citations on american cartoonists and their work author john lent has used all manner of methods to gather the citations searching library and online databases contacting scholars and other professionals attending conferences and festivals and scanning hundreds of periodicals he has gone to great length to categorize the citations in an easy to use scholarly fashion and in the process has helped to establish the field of comic art as an important part of social science and humanities research the ten volumes in this series covering all regions of the world constitute the largest printed bibliography of comic art in the world and serve as the beacon guiding the burgeoning fields of animation comics and cartooning they are the definitive works on comic art research and are exhaustive in their inclusiveness covering all types of publications academic trade popular fan etc from all over the world also included in these books are citations to systematically researched academic exercises as well as more ephemeral sources such as fanzines press articles and fugitive materials conference papers unpublished documents etc attesting to lent s belief that all pieces of information are vital in a new field of study such as comic art

uses a comic book format to shed light on the complex and emotionally charged situation of palestian arabs exploring the lives of israeli soldiers palestian refugees and children in the occupied territories

contains articles that profile twenty six authors writing teams and illustrators of graphic novels arranged alphabetically from joe sacco to marv wolfman and includes sidebars photographs and illustrations

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
