the american poet laureate shows how the state has been the silent center of poetic production in the united states since world war ii it is the first history of the national poetry office the u s poet laureate highlighting the careers of elizabeth bishop robert frost gwendolyn brooks robert pinsky tracy k smith juan felipe herrera and joy harjo at the nation s capitol it is also a history of how these state poets participated in national arts programming during the cold war drawing on previously unexplored archival materials at the library of congress and materials at the john f kennedy presidential library amy paeth describes the interactions of federal bodies including the central intelligence agency the state department and the national endowment for the arts with literary organizations and with private patrons including prozac

heiress ruth lilly the consolidation of public and private interests is crucial to the development of state verse culture recognizable at the first national poetry festival in 1962 which followed robert frost s mission to moscow and which became dominant in the late 1990s and early 2000s the american poet laureate contributes to a growing body of institutional and sociological approaches to u s literary production in the postwar era and demonstrates how poetry has played a uniquely important and largely underacknowledged role in the cultural front of the cold war

in 1962 the heritage series of black poetry founded and edited by paul breman published robert hayden s a ballad of remembrance by 1975 the series had published 27 volumes by some of the twentieth century s most important and influential poets as elaborated in lauri ramey s extensive scholarly introduction this innovative volume has dual purposes to provide primary sources that recover the history and legacy of this groundbreaking publishing venture and to serve as a research companion for scholars working on the series and on twentieth century black poetry never before published primary materials include paul breman s memoir retrospectives by several of the poets published in the series a photo documentary of w e b du bois s 1958 visit to the netherlands poems by poets represented in the series and scholarly essays also included are bibliographies of the heritage poets and of the heritage press archives at the chicago public library this reference work is an essential resource for scholars working in the fields of black poetry transatlantic studies and twentieth century book history

presents a comprehensive anthology of african american poetry covering over two centuries and includes selections by langston hughes gwendolyn brooks w e b du bois and many more

the encyclopedia of american poetry the twentieth century contains over 400 entries that treat a broad range of individual poets and poems along with many articles devoted to topics schools or periods of american verse in the century entries fall into three main categories poet entries which provide biographical and cultural contexts for the author s career entries on individual works which offer closer explication of the most resonant poems in the 20th century canon and topical entries which offer analyses of a given period of literary production school thematically constructed category or other verse tradition that historically has been in dialogue with the poetry of the united states

halifax s former poet laureate afua cooper and photographer wilfried raussert collaborate in this book of poems and photographs focused on everyday black experiences the result is a jambalaya a dialogue between image and text cooper translates raussert s photos into poetry painting a profound image of what disembodied historical facts might look like when they are embodied in contemporary characters this visual and textual conversation honours the multiple layers of blackness in the african diaspora around north america and europe the result is a work that amplifies black beauty and offers audible resistance

stephen henderson has edited an anthology of the best of black poetry with an emphasis on the poetry of the 60 s but this anthology differs from others in significant ways first the introduction is extensive giving tentative answers to such questions as what makes a poem black who decides what criteria does one use the author s thesis is that the new black poetry s main referents are black speech and black music second the author explores the many forms that black poets use commenting on what is black technically in the poetry third the poems anthologized include examples from the oral folk sermon spirituals blues ballad rap as well as the literary tradition from publisher s description

paul laurence dunbar poet laureate of the negro race 1914 is a pamphlet on american poet paul laurence dunbar published nearly a decade after dunbar s untimely death paul laurence dunbar poet laureate of the negro race contains three essays on his life his legacy and his importance to american literature born in dayton ohio dunbar was the son of parents who were emancipated from slavery in kentucky during the american civil war in 1893 he published oak and ivy a debut collection of poetry blending traditional verse and poems written in dialect over the next decade dunbar wrote ten more books of poetry four collections of short stories four novels a musical and a play in his brief career dunbar became a respected advocate for civil rights participating in meetings and helping to found the american negro academy his lyrics for in dahomey 1903 formed the centerpiece to the first musical written and performed by african americans on broadway and many of his essays and poems appeared in the nation s leading publications including harper s weekly and the saturday evening post diagnosed with tuberculosis in 1900 however dunbar s health steadily declined

in his final years leading to his death at the age of thirty three while at the height of his career alice dunbar nelson in her essay reflects on the man her husband was a true poet who reached out and groped for the bigness of the out of doors divining all that he was afterwards to see in his piece classical scholar william s scarborough argues for dunbar s importance to african american history as the first among ten million as a man who did not inherit but originated to close the collection reverdy c ransom briefly eulogizes a poet whose loss was a blow to a people and a nation whose name must be spoken in the same breath as wheatley browning shelley burns keats and poe more than anything paul laurence dunbar poet laureate of the negro race cements his reputation as an artist with a powerful vision of faith and perseverance who sought to capture and examine the diversity of the african american experience with a beautifully designed cover and professionally typeset manuscript this edition of paul laurence dunbar poet laureate of the negro race is a classic of african american literature reimagined for modern readers

biographical essays on 500 afro american women that combine life histories with information on the key people places institutions and events that have had an impact on these women

pinkie gordon lane louisiana s poet laureate has created in girl at the window a volume of poetry stitched together by love of place love of language and love of family a volume both intimate and generously welcoming the logic of the poems is lyrical rather than narrative but this poet s lyric is large enough to include a five year old child s memory of violence a trip to the bootlegger s with a father likened to ulysses and in a prose poem memories of a mother who tumbled around in the tight little from of a house in north philadelphia guarding its walls fiercely as if they belonged to the smithsonian her eye is unflinching but through precision of language and daring emotional leaps lane locates beauty even within troubling prospects take for example a stanza from a suite of poems about the city of baton rouge living in baton rouge is like living in the hollow of nowhere it is like disappearing into the night like darkness like sun like beauty like song like knowing you are surrounded only by your self like pouring your loneliness into a great pool of light the poems of family and friendship are just as strong in their ability to embrace and celebrate paradox images of wind and seasonal change simultaneously ground the poems in nature and keep them constantly in flux lewis simpson former editor of the southern review has called girl at the window a distinctive achievement in african american lyric poetry pinkie gordon lane s fourth volume of poetry is also a survival song a hymn of spirit in her words survival poem and a remarkable achievement in the poetry of personal history

the dictionary of midwestern literature volume one surveys the lives and writings of nearly 400 midwestern authors and identifies some of the most important criticism of their writings the dictionary is based on the belief that the literature of any region simultaneously captures the experience and influences the worldview of its people reflecting as well as shaping the evolving sense of individual and collective identity meaning and values volume one presents individual lives and literary orientations and offers a broad survey of the midwestern experience as expressed by its many diverse peoples over time philip a greasley s

introduction fills in background information and describes the philosophy focus methodology content and layout of entries as well as criteria for their inclusion an extended lead essay the origins and development of the literature of the midwest by david d anderson provides a historical cultural and literary context in which the lives and writings of individual authors can be considered this volume is the first of an ambitious three volume series sponsored by the society for the study of midwestern literature and created by its members volume two will provide similar coverage of non author entries such as sites centers movements influences themes and genres volume three will be a literary history of the midwest one goal of the series is to build understanding of the nature importance and influence of midwestern writers and literature another is to provide information on writers from the early years of the midwestern experience as well as those now emerging who are typically absent from existing reference works

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
