a thought provoking volume and one that brings an expanded perspective some aspects are unsettling some frightening some so distasteful that my reaction is to find another gig should the future be thus but i did find myself rethinking at idle moments and rereading most of the volume the works therein contributed to my own perspective well worth buying american journal of pastoral counseling i was admiring of those chapters which took a wide view this book can be seen as a read out of a number of attitudes within the profession and within society some are partisan or competitive occupied with the self justification and proselytizing that is likely to lead to in fighting others see the larger task the aware repositioning that needs to happen when the world is moving on this is a book worth reading for the depth and the width of much that is written in it and not just as a hologram of the present state of the profession many contributors give evidence of the self examination the awareness of the environment the largeness of vision and the strictness with self that are prerequisites for humility and learning they look cautiously forward both to what might be reached through the profession s best work and to the reductionist production line future that might be a worst outcome of regulation of confluence and complacent self interest self society many authors discuss some common themes for the future that include increased use of short term problem specific cost efficient forms of therapy all chapters were compelling interesting and readable contemporary psychology from the plethora of counselling books to be found in any reputable bookstore these days this is one i recommend you to buy the ten chapters give us a flavour of differing philosophical approaches to counselling and psychotherapy at the same time they provide a medium where leading exponents in the field can share their experience of practice and give their hunches as to where we may be heading as a profession it makes for a fascinating read it describes exciting developments already underway and gives a critique of where some developments have been less than helpful for anyone training practising tutoring or designing training courses i would recommend this as a thought provoking timely book dialogue a book with many benefits on reading this book the reader is made very aware that the psychotherapeutic professions are embedded in a social and political world illustrations are plenty and exceptionally well chosen for example holmes highlights how historical events such as the world wars or the study of communication systems affected the development of psychotherapeutic

a new book by John McLeod is always a treat and like good qualitative research takes the reader by surprise and shows him or her something new the revelation to me in this book is its focus on philosophy rather than psychology and on John's insistence that qualitative research is rooted in a mixture of phenomenology and hermeneutics those of us engaged in qualitative research are challenged to underpin our work with a deeper awareness of relevant philosophy with chapters 2, 3 and 4 offering a good starting point this book might not be seen then as being for the novice researcher who in any case would be best advised to start with one of John's earlier books *Doing Counselling Research* (Sage 1994) or *Practitioner Research in Counselling* (Sage 1999) however many parts of this book are essential reading for those beginning qualitative research the first half of chapter 9 for example how to do qualitative research is rich material as is chapter 6 which explores grounded theory referred to by John as the '2nd market leader' in qualitative research chapter 10 takes a critical stance on randomized controlled trials before arguing the case for using qualitative outcomes measures qualitative interviews appear to be at present the most sensitive method for the evaluation of the harmful effects of therapy and also for recording its greatest successes the standardized self-report methods used in randomized trials appear both to inhibit criticism of therapists and reporting of deterioration and also give little scope for clients to describe the hugely positive transformational experiences that can sometimes take place in counselling this book deeply addresses what it means to do qualitative research into counselling and psychotherapy with plenty for the novice researcher and even more for those already deeply immersed in qualitative research William West *Counselling and Psychotherapy Research* qualitative methods are particularly suited to answering the kinds of questions that counsellors and psychotherapists need to ask about their practice qualitative research in counselling and psychotherapy has therefore been written to help researchers find their way through the range of methodologies and techniques available to them leading expert and bestselling author John McLeod takes the reader through each stage of the research process explaining techniques for gathering data writing up the study and evaluating the findings each qualitative method is clearly described and critically assessed in terms of its own strengths and weaknesses examples from actual research studies are given to show how the methods work in practice the need to show how and why counselling works has led to an explosion of research activity for all those involved in research whether as part of academic study or in practice this book will be essential reading as an introduction to qualitative methods this it is certain to be widely recommended on courses in counselling and counselling psychology and will also be of interest to those who provide counselling in other professional areas such as nursing and social work

the official birth of counselling psychology is said to have occurred in 1951 when key united states leaders in what was then called the field of guidance and counselling formally adopted the terms counselling psychologist and counselling psychology to describe their profession in the 65 years that have followed counselling psychology has thrived as reflected in the fact that it now is a recognized applied psychology specialty in a number of countries worldwide the form and expression of counselling psychology differs across countries and yet the specialty retains certain recognizable features wherever it is practiced drawing on data collected through a survey of professionals in eight different countries this volume considers both ways in which the specialty is distinctive within each of the eight countries as well as that which is characteristic of counselling psychology across them all this survey of the international character of counselling psychology examines the emergence and the history of the field the training preparation and credentialing of professionals and the practices and practice settings of counselling psychologists this book was originally published as a special issue of counselling psychology quarterly

roles and contexts in counselling psychology looks at the different contexts that counselling psychologists typically work within offering a snapshot of the day job the book provides insights into roles that reflect the human lifespan from birth to death focusing upon specific mental health experiences and considering roles external to healthcare settings such as expert witness and independent practice each chapter is written by a counselling psychologist and offers an overview of their particular specialism and their experiences within it bringing a unique transparency and personal insight the book describes the skills that are required for the different roles and their challenges and rewards it also discusses how the philosophy of counselling psychology is maintained and explores the associated ethical and legal considerations further it takes note of the issues relating to leadership and diversity the book is an essential resource for undergraduate psychology and counselling students and trainee clinical or counselling psychologists as well as qualified practitioners
