the eighth and final volume of the cambridge history of africa covers the period 1940 75 it begins with a discussion of the role of the second world war in the political decolonisation of africa its terminal date of 1975 coincides with the retreat of portugal the last european colonial power in africa from its possessions and their accession to independence the fifteen chapters which make up this volume examine on both a continental and regional scale the extent to which formal transfer of political power by the european colonial rulers also involved economic social and cultural decolonisation a major theme of the volume is the way the african successors to the colonial rulers dealt with their inheritance and how far they benefited particular economic groups and disadvantaged others the contributors to this volume represent different disciplinary traditions and do not share a single theoretical perspective on the recent history of the continent a subject that is still the occasion for passionate debate

this comprehensive and detailed exploration of the african past from prehistory to approximately 1870 is intended to provide a fully up to date complement to the cambridge history of africa reflecting several emphases in recent scholarship it focusses on the changing modes of production on gender relations and on ecology laying particular stress on viewing history from below a distinctive theme is to be found in its analyses of cognitive history the work falls into three sections the first comprises a historiographic analysis and covers the period from the dawn of prehistory to the end of the early iron age the second and third sections are for the most part organised on regional lines the second section ends in the sixteenth century the third carries the story on to 1870 a second volume now in preparation will cover the period from 1870 to

1995 this book attempts a more rounded view of african history than most of the other textbooks on the subject addressed to a largely undergraduate level student earlier histories have tended to ignore some of the current foci in the scholarly literature on africa generally not reflected in the textbooks these include discussions of topical issues like ecology and gender isichei s book is also more radical
