gloria e anzaldúa is a crucial figure in contemporary border and women s studies when in 1987 she published her groundbreaking book *borderlands la frontera the new mestiza* she became one of the most often quoted writers of the us mexico border but she remains relatively little known outside americas in one of the first monographs written on her work *gra na zygad o* introduces anzaldúa s work and outlines her feminist revisionist thinking to new audiences especially in europe the author defines these borderlands as areas where numerous systems of power exploitation and oppression intersect capitalism patriarchy racism and white man s supremacy she also concentrates on the innovative philosophy of women s writing from the body that anzaldúa has propagated and on her formative role in the women of color feminism *zygad o* also works to expand anzaldúa s borderland thinking by applying it to the recent issues related to migration crisis and border problems in the european union namely the contradictory treatment of refugees at the polish eastern border gloria e anzaldúa is situated at the intersection of various disciplines in particular american cultural studies feminist criticism and latin american postcolonial studies and is a valuable source of knowledge about anzaldúa s ideas for undergraduate and graduate students

although fictional and often fantastic representations of nature have been a distinguishing feature of latin american literature for centuries ecocriticism understood as the study of literature as it relates to depictions of the natural world environmental issues and the ways in which human beings interact and identify with their natural surroundings did not emerge as a field of scholarly interest in the region until

the end of the twentieth century this volume employs an ecocritical lens in order to explore and question the use of the river imagery in latino and latin american literature from the colonial period to our modern world creating a space in which to examine both its literal and figurative meanings associated as much with processes of a personal nature as with those of the collective experience in the region the slow meandering streams of nostalgia the raging currents of conflict or the stagnant waters of social decay are just a few of the ways in which the river has become an important symbol and inspiration to many of the region s writers this book offers a diverse collection of writings that through a trans historical and trans geographical perspective allows us from the vantage point of the twenty first century to reflect on the rich and dynamic image of the river and by extension on the vital context of latin o america its people and societies

santa cruz a number of scholarships and book awards including the anzaldúa scholar activist award and the gloria e anzaldúa award for independent scholars are awarded in her name every year
