during the age of enlightenment music aestheticians first became actively interested in the relationship between music and numerous other branches of intellectual activity by the late nineteenth century however there had been a proliferation of sophisticated musicological research techniques by positivists primarily preoccupied with scientific concepts of music as sound such an approach tended to detach music from its cultural and social environment throughout the twentieth century numerous theories on music aesthetics have returned to concepts of musical meaning and communication that were common practice during the enlightenment to avoid becoming defunct music aesthetics has had to move in new directions to cope with the changing and diverse phenomena of musical experience in contemporary society an aesthetic evaluation of popular music as an art form undoubtedly demands the formulation of some aesthetic theory from jstor org feb 3 2014

this book re examines the notion of aesthetic experience as well as its value a team of internationally respected contributors bring together major voices that have directly theorised the concept of aesthetic experience or indirectly worked on topics connected to it

this concise yet comprehensive introduction to the discipline of western aesthetical philosophy is focused directly on the central questions of aesthetics fenner arranges his analysis around four general themes experiences objects and events meaning and judgment that progress from issues of everyday experience to subjects of greater subtlety within these broader themes fenner explores such issues as the aesthetic attitude defining art and reviewing art criticism although a historical organization is employed wherever a particular movement unfolds from earlier movements the text's main organization is not motivated by an academic or historical treatment of the various topics instead the topics themselves are of primary concern in such a way that readers will come away with a complete overview of the canon of this highly significant area of western philosophy

across these essays arnold berleant demonstrates how aesthetic values and theory can be used to reappraise our social practices he tackles issues within the built environment everyday life and politics breaking down the dichotomy between the natural and the human his work represents a fresh approach to traditional philosophical questions in not only ethics but in metaphysics truth meaning psychology phenomenology and social and moral philosophy topics covered include the cultural aesthetics of environment ecological aesthetics the aesthetics of terrorism and the subversion of beauty the corruption of taste by the forces of commercial interests as well as how aesthetics can advance our understanding of violence are also considered berleant's exploration is supported by his analysis of 19th century art to the present day starting with impressionism through to postmodernism and contemporary artistic interventions by critically examining the field in this way and casting new light on social understanding and practice this collection makes a substantive contribution in identifying and clarifying central human issues guided by an understanding of aesthetic engagement as a powerful tool for social critique

blindness has always fascinated those who can see although modern imaginative portrayals of the sightless experience are increasingly positive the affirmative elements of these renderings are inevitably tempered and problematized by the visual predilections of the artists undertaking them this book explores a variety of the discontinuities between depictions of the sightless experience of beauty by sighted artists and the lived aesthetic experiences of blind people it does so by pressing a radical interdisciplinary reinterpretation of celebrated dramatic portrayals of blindness into service as a tool with which to probe the boundaries of the capacities of the sighted imagination while exploring the sensory detriment of our visually fixated notions of beauty works by j m synge w b yeats and brian friel are explored as a means of crafting a workable and innovative medium of theoretical and experiential exchange between the disciplines of literature aesthetics and disability studies in addition to appraising previously unexamined aspects of the work of three of ireland's most celebrated modern dramatists this book considers the consequences for blind people of the exclusionary and prohibitive elements of traditional aesthetic theory and art education the insights yielded will be of value to those with an interest in modern literature differential aesthetics visual culture perception and the experience of blindness

in aesthetics and material beauty jennifer a mcMahon develops a new aesthetic theory she terms critical aesthetic realism taking kantian aesthetics as a starting point and drawing upon contemporary theories of mind from philosophy psychology and cognitive science the creative process does not proceed by a set of rules yet the fact that its objects can be understood or appreciated by others suggests that the creative process is constrained by principles to which others have access according to her update of kantian aesthetics beauty is grounded in indeterminate yet systematic principles of perception and cognition however kant's aesthetic theory rested on a notion of indeterminacy whose consequences for understanding the nature of art were implausible mcMahon conceptualizes indeterminacy in terms of contemporary philosophical psychological and computational theories of mind in doing so she develops an aesthetic theory that reconciles the apparent dichotomies which stem from the tension between the determinacy of communication and the indeterminacy of creativity dichotomies such as universality and subjectivity objectivity and autonomy cognitivism and non cognitivism and truth and beauty are revealed as complementary features of an aesthetic judgment

aesthetic sensibility rests on perceptual experience and characterizes not only our experience of the arts but our experience of the world sensibility and sense offers a philosophically comprehensive account of humans social and cultural embeddedness encountered recognized and fulfilled as an aesthetic mode of experience extending the range of aesthetic experience from the stone of the earth's surface to the celestial sphere the book focuses on the aesthetic as a dimension of social experience the guiding idea of pervasive interconnectedness both social and environmental leads to an aesthetic critique of the urban environment the environment of daily life and of terrorism and has profound implications for grounding social and political values the aesthetic emerges as a powerful critical tool for appraising urban culture and political practice

aesthetics is a branch of philosophy dealing with the nature of art beauty and taste with the creation and appreciation of beauty it is more scientifically defined as the study of sensory or sensori emotional values sometimes called judgments of sentiment and taste more broadly scholars in the field define aesthetics as critical reflection on art culture and nature in modern english the term aesthetic can also refer to a set of principles underlying the works of a particular art movement or theory for example the cubist aesthetic for some aesthetics is considered a synonym for the philosophy of art since hegel while others insist that there is a significant distinction between these closely related fields in practice aesthetic judgement refers to the sensory contemplation or appreciation of an object not necessarily an art object while artistic judgement refers to the recognition appreciation or criticism of art or an art work philosophical aesthetics has not only to speak about art and to produce judgments about art works but has also to give a definition of what art is art is an autonomous entity for philosophy because art deals with the senses i e the etymology of aesthetics and art is as such free of any moral or political purpose hence there are two different conceptions of art in aesthetics art as knowledge or art as action but aesthetics is neither epistemology nor ethics this book concentrates on the branch of philosophy called aesthetics
