- 2 Other Income This could include membership fees late payment fees or income from workshops or seminars
- 2 Expense Accounts This is where you categorize all your outgoing payments A comprehensive list includes Salaries Wages Separate accounts for chiropractors assistants office staff and other employees Include payroll taxes and benefits as separate subaccounts Rent Utilities Include rent for your office space electricity water gas and internet services Insurance Professional liability insurance property insurance and health insurance for employees Supplies Materials Track expenses

related to office supplies cleaning supplies and consumable items used in treatments Marketing Advertising Expenses related to website maintenance online advertising brochures and other marketing activities Professional Fees Account for fees paid to accountants lawyers consultants and other professionals Depreciation Account for the depreciation of assets like equipment Xray machine adjusting tables over their useful lifespan Travel Entertainment Track expenses related to professional conferences client events or businessrelated travel Loan Payments Categorize payments towards any business loans or financing Software Technology Track subscriptions to practice management software electronic health records EHR systems and other technology

3 Asset Accounts These represent what your practice owns Cash Your checking and savings accounts Accounts Receivable Money owed to your practice by patients or insurance companies Inventory The value of your retail products Equipment The value of your chiropractic equipment Prepaid Expenses Expenses paid in advance like rent or insurance

4 Liability Accounts These represent what your practice owes Accounts Payable Money owed to vendors or suppliers Loans Payable Outstanding loan balances Payroll Liabilities Amounts owed for payroll taxes and employee benefits

3 5 Equity Accounts This represents the owners investment in the practice Capital The initial investment in the business Retained Earnings Accumulated profits that havent been distributed
