this thought provoking book explores the very roots of religious thinking draws on contemporary images of religion as well as providing fascinating insights into religious fundamentalism

if you no longer believe in god the supreme being of classical theology or you never did in the first place is there anything you still ought to believe anything you should cherish unconditionally no matter what in this lively and accessible book addressed to believers recovering believers disbelievers nonbelievers and nones alike to anyone in search of what they really do believe the acclaimed philosopher and theologian john d caputo seeks out what there is to believe with or without religion writing in a lucid and witty style caputo offers a bold account of a radical theology that is anything but what the word theology suggests to most people his point of departure is autobiographical describing growing up in the world of pre vatican ii catholicism serving as an altar boy and spending four years in a catholic religious order after high school caputo places augustine s confessions tillich s dynamics of

faith and jacques derrida and postmodern theory in conversation in the service of what he calls the mystical sense of life he argues that radical theology is not simply an academic exercise but describes a concrete practice immediately relevant to the daily lives of believers and nonbelievers alike what to believe is an engaging introduction to radical theology for all readers curious about what religion can mean today

john d caputo stretches his project as a radical theologian to new limits in this groundbreaking book mapping out his summative theological position he identifies with martin luther to take on notions of the hidden god the theology of the cross confessional theology and natural theology caputo also confronts the dark side of the cross with its correlation to lynching and racial and sexual discrimination caputo is clear that he is not writing as any kind of orthodox lutheran but is instead engaging with a radical view of theology cosmology and poetics of the cross readers will recognize caputo s signature themes hermeneutics deconstruction weakness and the call as well as his unique voice as he writes about moral life and our strivings for joy against contemporary society and politics

the author of what would jesus deconstruct makes a bold attempt to reconfigure the terms of debate around the topic of divine omnipotence choice applying an ever more radical hermeneutics including husserlian and heideggerian phenomenology derridian deconstruction and feminism john d caputo breaks down the name of god in this irrepressible book instead of looking at god as merely a name caputo views it as an event or what the name conjures or promises in the future for caputo the event exposes god as weak unstable and barely functional while this view of god flies in the face of most religions and philosophies it also puts up a serious challenge to fundamental tenets of theology and ontology along the way caputo s readings of the new testament especially of paul s view of the kingdom of god help to support the weak force theory this penetrating work cuts to the core of issues

and questions what is the nature of god what is the nature of being what is the relationship between god and being what is the meaning of forgiveness faith piety or transcendence that define the terrain of contemporary philosophy of religion caputo comes out of the closet as a theologian in this work catherine keller drew university caputo has a gift for explaining continental philosophy s jargon succinctly and accurately and despite technical and foreign terms this book will engage upper level undergraduates includes scriptural and general indexes highly recommended choice

the theological turn in continental philosophy and the turn to paul in political philosophy have occasioned a return to radical theology a tradition whose philosophical heritage can be traced to the death of god announced in the work of nietzsche and hegel john d caputo's deconstructive theology and slavoj zizek's materialist theology are two radical theologies that explore what it might mean to pass through the death of god and to abandon this experience as specifically christian radical theology and emerging christianity demonstrates how these theologies are transforming everyday religious practices through an examination of the work of peter rollins and kester brewin two figures at the radical margins of a contemporary expression of western religiosity called emerging christianity the author uses her analysis of all four figures to argue that deconstructive practices can enable religious communities to become part of a wider materialist collective in which the death of god continues to resonate pushing the methodological boundaries of philosophy of religion by examining religious practices as the site of philosophical signification the book challenges scholars and practitioners alike to a new and more demanding dialogue between theory and practice

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what comes after the end of christendom christianity has ceased to function as the dominant force in society and yet the christian faith continues how are we to understand christianity in this after bringing into conversation seven unorthodox or heretical continental philosophers including jan patocka jean luc nancy gianni vattimo and john d caputo martin koci re centres the debates around philosophy s so called return to religion to address the current not christian but not yet non christian culture in the modern context of increasing secularization and pluralization christianity after christendom boldly proposes that christians must embrace the demise of christianity as a meta narrative and see their faith as an existential mode of being in the world whilst not denying the religion s history this after of christianity emancipates the discourse from the socio historical focus on christendom and introduces new perspectives on christianity as an embodied religious tradition as a way of being even as a faithfulness to the world in dialogue with a broad range of philosophical movements including deconstruction phenomenology hermeneutics and postmodern critiques of religion this is a timely examination of the present and future of post christendom christianity

it has long been assumed that the more modern we become the less religious we will be yet a recent

resurgence in faith has challenged the validity of this belief in these original essays and interviews leading hermeneutical philosophers and postmodern theorists john d caputo and gianni vattimo engage with each other s past and present work on the subject and reflect on our transition from secularism to postsecularism caputo and vattimo explore the changes distortions and reforms that are a part of our postmodern faith and the forces shaping the religious imagination today incisively and imaginatively connecting their argument to issues ranging from terrorism to fanaticism and from politics to media and culture these thinkers continue to reinvent the field of hermeneutic philosophy with wit grace and compassion
