stoddard uses the anglophone caribbean and ireland to examine the complex inflections of women and race as articulated in between the colonial discursive and material formations of the eighteenth century and those of the post colonial twentieth century as structured by the defined spaces of the colonizers estates

presents literary criticism on the works of twentieth century writers of all genres nations and cultures critical essays are selected from leading sources including published journals magazines books reviews diaries interviews radio and television transcripts pamphlets and scholarly papers

feminist political geography is a relatively new but rapidly growing area of interest in geographical scholarship it emerged from feminist engagement with the sub discipline of political geography which broadly concerns the intersection of politics power and space and it responds to silences and absences in this sub discipline as well as wider silences in geography scholarship while early scholarship in feminist political geography concentrated on including women s bodies and lives in scholarship its focus has evolved and expanded over time today feminist political geography scholarship advances broader goals that do not necessarily entail a research focus on women but push us to think about other lives and bodies that are traditionally absent from analysis it challenges us to reimagine and build just futures like all feminist analysis this body of scholarship is not content with describing or explaining injustices it advances a normative critique of injustice and overtly commits itself to the project of justice in this book the reader will find chapters authored by leading scholars who interrogate key ideas debates and developments with a particular focus on intersectional ideas structured into four sections that go from the origins of feminist political geography to its futures this handbook is the definitive state of the art survey of this vibrant sub discipline

this book studies sugarcane monoculture the dominant form of cultivation in the colonial caribbean in the later 1600s and 1700s up to the haitian revolution researching travel literature plantation manuals georgic poetry letters and political proclamations this book interprets texts by richard ligon henry drax james grainger janet schaw and toussaint louverture as the first extended investigation into its topic this book reads colonial caribbean monoculture as the conjunction of racial capitalism and agrarian capitalism in the tropics its eco marxist perspective highlights the dual exploitation of the soil and of enslaved agricultural producers under the plantation regime thereby extending marxist analysis to the early colonial caribbean by focusing on textual form in literary and non literary texts alike this study discloses the bearing of monoculture on contemporary writers thoughts in the process it emphasizes the significance of a literary tradition that despite its ideological importance is frequently neglected in postcolonial literary studies and the environmental humanities located at a crossroads of disciplines and perspectives this study will be of interest to literary cultural critics and historians working in the early americas and in atlantic studies to students and scholars of agriculture colonialism and racial capitalism to marxists and postcolonial critics and to those working in the environmental humanities and in global south studies

between the 1880s and the 1940s opportunities for southern white women writers increased dramatically bolstered by readers demands for southern stories in northern periodicals confined by magazine requirements and social expectations writers often relied on regional settings and tropes to attract publishers and readers before publishing work in a collection selecting and ordering magazine stories for these collections was not arbitrary or dictated by editors despite a male dominated publishing industry instead it allowed writers to privilege stories or to contextualize a story by its proximity to other tales as a form of social commentary for kate chopin ellen glasgow marjorie kinnan rawlings and katherine anne porter the authors featured in this book publishing a volume of stories enabled them to construct a narrative framework of their own arranging stories framing social commentary in short story collections by southern women writers is as much about how stories are constructed as how they are told the book examines

correspondence manuscripts periodicals and first editions of collections each collection's textual history serves as a case study for changes in the periodical marketplace and demonstrates how writers negotiated this marketplace to publish stories and garner readership the book also includes four tables featuring collected stories arrangements and publication histories and twenty five illustrations featuring periodical publications unpublished letters and manuscript fragments obtained from nine on site and digital archives short story collections guide readers through a spatial experience in which both individual stories and the ordering of those stories become a framework for interpreting meaning arranging stories invites readings that complicate how we engage collected works

this book promotes a novel and nuanced understanding of how the practices of comparative literature have engaged with the politics of nation building in postcolonial southeast asia it provides readings of southeast asian literatures in a comparative context demonstrating how such readings enable texts to engage with issues connected to postcolonial nation building across the region such issues include social exclusion urbanization and environmental destruction post war traumas animal narratives migration identity gender and literature and politics in doing so this book moves beyond traditional comparative literature which is overwhelmingly rooted in western literature and scholarship to this end it an invitation to decolonize comparative literature as a discipline few studies have attempted to examine the alternative non western literary traditions that emerge from this specific asian region and so this book presents a rich combination of theoretical and critical studies that contribute to advancing the discipline of comparative literature in southeast asian geographies it is relevant to scholars working in asian literature comparative literature and in postcolonial frameworks in philosophy and cultural studies
