background key techniques and applications this ground breaking reference examines emotion from a dimensional perspective it defines emotions in music as points in a 2d plane in terms of two of the most fundamental emotion dimensions according to psychologists valence and arousal

music s fourth wall and the rise of reflective listening examines fundamental changes in concert hall listening since the enlightenment with an emphasis on changing assumptions about the very act of listening itself author mark evan bonds shows how reflective distanced listening previously limited to professional musicians and connoisseurs ousted the earlier ideal of resonant self forgetful listening and for better or worse it is the ideal of reflective listening that has prevailed ever since

do you struggle to connect the dots between the bible and your life while christians instinctively want to apply scripture we encounter difficulties that can discourage us and diminish our engagement with god s word indeed biblical application has suffered in various ways in the church everything from neglect to abuse to contempt responding to such challenges beyond chapter and verse provides a biblically based rationale for the practice of application and then proposes a biblically consistent method for application the book is substantive but accessible relevant for believers generally as well as preachers it begins by sketching the broad theological context of bible application relating it to the gospel generally and to sanctification specifically the heart of the study then synthesizes key old and new testament passages relative to the process of application building on this foundation the book sets forth a sensible approach for arriving at legitimate applications of scripture a rich assortment of positive and negative case studies illustrates the method motivating believers to apply the scriptures for themselves

inquiry guided learning igl refers to an array of classroom practices that promote student learning through guided and increasingly independent investigation of complex questions and problems rather than teaching the results of others investigations which students

learn passively instructors assist students in mastering and learning through the process of active investigation itself igl develops critical thinking independent inquiry students responsibility for their own learning and intellectual growth and maturity the 1999 boyer commission report emphasized the importance of establishing a firm grounding in inquiry based learning and communication of information and ideas while this approach capitalizes on one of the key strengths of research universities the expertise of its faculty in research it is one that can be fruitfully adopted throughout higher education north carolina state university is at the forefront of the development and implementation of igl both at the course level and as part of a successful faculty led process of reform of undergraduate education in a complex research institution this book documents and explores nosus igl initiative from a variety of perspectives how faculty arrived at their current understanding of inquiry guided learning and how they have interpreted it at various levels the individual course the major the college the university wide program and the undergraduate curriculum as a whole the contributors show how igl has been dovetailed with other complementary efforts and programs and how they have assessed its impact the book is divided into four parts the first briefly summarizing the history of the initiative part two the largest section describes how various instructors departments and colleges in a range of disciplines have interpreted inquiry guided learning it provides examples from disciplines as varied as ecology engineering foreign language learning history music microbiology physics and psychology it also outlines the potential for even broader dissemination of inquiry guided learning in the undergraduate curriculum as a whole part three describes two inquiry guided learning programs for first year students and the interesting ways in which nesu s university wide writing and speaking program and growing service learning program support inquiry guided learning part four documents how the institution has supported instructors and how they have supported themselves as well as the methods used to assess the impact of inquiry guided learning on students faculty and the institution as a whole the book has been written with three audiences in mind instructors who want to use inquiry guided learning in their classrooms faculty developers considering supporting comparable efforts on their campuses and administrators interested in managing similar undergraduate reform efforts it will also appeal to instructors of courses in the administration of higher education who are looking for

relevant case studies of reform while this is a model successfully implemented at a research university it is one that is relevant for all institutions of higher education
