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the gothic cathedral focuses on the interaction between design and the requirements of patrons following the creative processes of architects by reconstructing the problems and opportunities which faced them christopher wilson presents the essential facts on such aspects as chronology structural techniques and stylistic developments and then goes further seeing the story as a sequence of choices from which new solutions arose which in their turn gave rise to still more challenges illustrated with carefully chosen photographs and specially drawn diagrams this fresh perceptive and provocative book has already established itself as a definitive introduction to the subject

founded as the main church of the knights templar in england at their new temple in london the temple church is historically and architecturally one of the most important medieval buildings in england its round nave modelled on the holy sepulchre in jerusalem is extraordinarily ambitious combining lavish romanesque sculpture with some of the earliest gothic architectural features in any english building of its period it holds one of the most famous series of medieval effigies in the country the luminous thirteenth century choir intended for the burial of henry iii is of exceptional beauty major developments in the post medieval period include the reordering of the church in the 1680s by sir christopher wren and a substantial restoration programme in the early 1840s despite its extraordinary importance however it has until now attracted little scholarly or critical attention a gap which is remedied by this volume it considers the new temple as a whole in the middle ages and all aspects of the church itself from its foundation in the twelfth century to its war time damage in the twentieth richly illustrated with numerous black and white and colour plates it makes full use of the exceptional range and quality of the antiquarian material available for study including drawings photographs and plaster casts contributors robin griffith jones virginia jansen philip lankester helen nicholson david park rosemary sweet william whyte christopher wilson

the great gothic cathedrals of europe are among the most astonishing achievements of western culture evoking feelings of awe and humility they make us want to understand what inspired the people who had the audacity to build them this engrossing book surveys an era that has fired the historical imagination for centuries in it robert a scott explores why medieval people built gothic cathedrals how they built them what conception of the divine lay behind their creation and how religious and secular leaders used cathedrals for social and political purposes as a traveler s companion or a rich source of knowledge for the armchair enthusiast the gothic enterprise helps us understand how ordinary people managed such tremendous feats of physical and creative energy at a time when technology was rudimentary famine and disease were rampant the climate was often harsh and communal life was unstable and incessantly violent while most books about gothic cathedrals focus on a particular building or on the cathedrals of a specific region the gothic enterprise considers the idea of the cathedral as a humanly created space scott discusses why an impoverished people would commit so many social and personal resources to building something so physically stupendous and what this says

about their ideas of the sacred especially the vital role they ascribed to the divine as a protector against the dangers of everyday life scott s narrative offers a wealth of fascinating details concerning daily life during medieval times the author describes the difficulties master builders faced in scheduling construction that wouldn t be completed during their own lifetimes how they managed without adequate numeric systems or paper on which to make detailed drawings and how climate natural disasters wars variations in the hours of daylight throughout the year and the celebration of holy days affected the pace and timing of work scott also explains such things as the role of relics the quarrying and transporting of stone and the incessant conflict cathedral building projects caused within their communities finally by drawing comparisons between gothic cathedrals and other monumental building projects such as stonehenge scott expands our understanding of the human impulses that shape our landscape

travel was once a way in which the world changed us now it is a way in which we change the world twenty five years ago two things made mass tourism possible cheap air travel and the credit card the world has come a long way since then and very quickly from the need for either travel agents or traveler s checks from the now vast cruise ship industry to a myriad of niche areas such as do good tourism self improvement tourism sex tourism and adventure tourism travel as an industry and an activity reaches into corners and has developed on scales not hitherto imagined in trapped by tourism sustainability questions for a world fueled by travelers larry krotz explores the tensions that formed with the rise of mass tourism focusing on what travelers want vs what travelers do and the sustainability of tourism itself both as it plays out in economies and as a factor impacting natural and cultural environments we will never shut down tourism we are destined to have it and to participate in it but what truly are its implications for the world we live in if communities and governments seek economic benefits they must also look at the trade offs commodification of cultures economic unfairness environmental stresses and much more by delving into examples ranging from the wine industry to indigenous communities krotz looks at how what we do and how we do it affects important corners of the world and how awareness has developed about steering the impacts in ways that work for everybody trapped by tourism takes readers around the world to locations such as the old cities of europe indigenous communities in north america and africa wine growing regions in canada the island of cuba and cathedral towns in england places where tourism as an economic driver come up against environmental or cultural forces that push in exactly the opposite direction creating tensions within today s mass tourism the result is a thoughtful and provocative framework that encourages readers and travelers alike to consider an ever growing component of our culture the way we travel and the impact we leave behind

medieval cathedrals and the various practices connected to them form an important and complex part of the european cultural heritage the buildings themselves and their reception into the modern arts ensure their presence within today s cultural memories and sensibilities in the mid twelfth century a new archbishop s seat was

erected in the norwegian city of trondheim or nidaros at the far north of europe this interdisciplinary volume written by scholars of history architecture and liturgy explores the medieval cathedral of trondheim as a local construction in a european context as a see of the western church it was set in an international latinate culture at the same time the construction of the building itself and the ritual practices in and around it were influenced by local political religious and cultural conditions the relationship between the physical construction of a cathedral and its function in medieval liturgical and other ritual practices is a topic of wide relevance for architectural and liturgical scholarship the so called ordo nidrosiensis the thirteenth century ordinal of the province of nidaros is an immense help in interpreting the architectural construction and sacred space of nidaros cathedral and the ordo is dealt with in many of the articles in accordance with general medieval practice the nidaros ordinal may be described as international in contents but edited with regard to local considerations

this is a lavishly illustrated history of britain s greatest cathedral from its anglo saxon origins to the late twentieth century seven chronological chapters tell the fascinating story of canterbury from 597 while a further five thematic chapters discuss the cathedral school the archives and library the liturgy and music and the monuments within the cathedral the contributors are all leading scholars and their chapters are based on the most up to date research their emphasis is on the people who over the centuries have formed the community of canterbury and continued the tradition of christian worship there for over a thousand years a history of canterbury cathedral will be essential for readers with an interest in the cathedral as well as for scholars and students of cultural religious ecclesiastical and architectural history

an architectural history of peterborough clarifies the obscure and tangled building history of one of england s most interesting medieval monuments lisa reilly demonstrates how peterborough offers extensive information concerning both specific buildings such as canterbury and broader issues of the period such as the process of cultural assimilation patterns of construction and building design as a response to liturgical needs this study represents an expansion of the traditional use of formal and archaeological analysis to include a discussion of the building s social and political context the entire fabric is discussed from its anglo saxon remains the anglo norman construction of the nave choir and transepts the early gothic period which produced its well known west front through to the final construction of its fan vaulted retrochoir at the very end of the middle ages peterborough cathedral is the best preserved example of anglo norman architecture and provides an ideal case study for the period

the cathedral is one of england s most important medieval buildings a fact which its dramatic later history has helped to obscure this volume discusses the history of lichfield from the roman period to the late nineteenth century it casts new light on its archaeology and development places some of the principle building campaigns in their wider national setting and considers the ways in which later architects sought to interpret and repair the fabric of the cathedral it also brings into focus the local context and in so doing examines important buildings with which few students of medieval studies and architectural history will be familiar

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
