nationhood and improvised belief in american fiction highlights the ways religious belief and practice intersect with questions of national belonging in the work of major contemporary writers through readings of novels by louise erdrich toni morrison cristina garcía and others this book argues that the representations of syncretic culturally hybrid and improvised forms of religious practice operate in these novels as critiques of exclusionary constructions of national identity providing models for alternate ways of belonging based on shared religious beliefs and practices rather than treating the religious history of the u s as one of increasing secularization this book instead calls for greater attention to the diversity of religious experience in the u s as well as a deeper understanding of the ways in which these experiences can inform relationships to the national community

this introduction makes available for both student instructor and aficionado a refined set of tools for decolonizing our approaches prior to entering the unfamiliar landscape of native american literatures this book will introduce indigenous perspectives and traditions as articulated by indigenous authors whose voices have been a vital if often overlooked component of the american dialogue for more than 400 years paramount to this consideration of native centered reading is the understanding that literature was not something bestowed upon native peoples by the settler culture either through benevolent interventions or violent programs of forced assimilation native literature precedes colonization and native stories and traditions have their roots in both the precolonized and the decolonizing worlds as this far reaching survey of native literary contributions will demonstrate almost without fail when indigenous writers elected to enter into the world of western letters they did so with the intention of maintaining indigenous culture and community writing was and always remains a strategy for survival

palace strongly resembles the turtle mountain reservation in the north central part of the state and erdrich's hometown of wahpeton in the southeast on the minnesota border nonetheless much has been made of the similarity of the fate of the ojibwe characters in tracks with the historical outrage perpetrated against the white earth anishinaabeg from the signing of the dawes act in 1887 to the nadir of native american wellbeing in the early 1920s in 1988 the same year tracks was published erdrich co wrote with her then husband michael dorris an expose of this travesty that was published in the new york times magazine which added to speculation that the politicized novel was a thinly veiled account of white earth lost in the rush to place tracks in minnesota however was the fact that the historical turtle mountain ojibwe in north dakota experienced just as egregious a theft of timber rich tribal land both prior and subsequent to the dawes act and in some ways served as the textbook example for the fraud committed at white earth

selected by choice magazine as an outstanding academic book for 1999 since the 1968 publication of n scott momaday's house made of dawn a new generation of native american storytellers has chosen writing over oral traditions while their works have found an audience by observing many of the conventions of the mainstream novel native american written narrative has emerged as something distinct from the postmodern novel with which it is often compared in dreams of fiery stars catherine rainwater examines the novels of writers such as momaday linda hogan leslie marmon silko gerald vizenor and louise erdrich and contends that the very act of writing narrative imposes constraints upon these authors that are foreign to native american tradition their works amount to a break with and a transformation of american indian storytelling the book focuses on the agenda of social and cultural regeneration encoded in contemporary native american narrative and addresses key questions about how these works achieve their overtly stated political and revisionary aims rainwater explores the ways in which the writers create readers who understand the connection between storytelling and personal and social transformation considers how contemporary native american narrative rewrites western notions of space and time examines the existence of intertextual connections between native american works and looks at the vital role of native american literature in mainstream society today

many poets playwrights and novelists have grappled with the concept of time even more scholars have analyzed how novelists have used time for structuring organizing plotting and philosophizing this collection of essays about the use of time in the novel is unique not only because the writers cover a wide range of concepts of time but also because they locate certain novels within a specific time culture the chapters analyze novels and one film with definite time cultures providing hints as to the future of the use of time in the novel emily bald's chapter begins the collection in the nineteenth century with life in the iron mills showing both inner time the perceptual time which fluctuates with the vicissitudes of affective experience and external time which has become known as clock time this ties in well with rachel kaufmann's chapter exploring felt time in contemporary women's literature marco caracciolo's chapter adds cosmic time to

ricoeur's monumental and mortal time with the case studies of Virginia Woolf's *The Waves* and Terrence Malick's film *The Tree of Life*. Two chapters explore the effects of World War Two. J. M. Coetzee presents the disorienting technique of Martin Amis' *Time's Arrow* that shows time going backwards even in dialogue. Raymond Burt presents two novels of Michael Kohlmeier, a contemporary Austrian writer spanning the decades since the end of World War Two with his chapter drawing the link between time and morality. The final chapter on Calvino's *If on a Winter's Night a Traveler* shows the multiplicity of time that the previous chapters have demonstrated so clearly. Terms such as affect, truth, haunting, memory, reality, identity, morality, and mortality all resonate within these chapters as characters within the novels and their specific culture areas grapple with time, recall the past, and attempt to live in the present. Many of the writers in this collection point towards possible new methods of dealing with time, reading methods engaging with the novel writers of the future in new and interesting relationships. Here, time has not been wasted.

This collection of essays focuses on Erdrich's writings rooted in the Chippewa experience. The contributors investigate narrative structure, signs of ethnicity, the notions of luck and chance, her use of metaphors, her efforts to counter stereotypes of American Indian women, and her use of comedy.

this work is a collection of critical essays on the fiction and scholarship of one of native america s most loved and respected writers drawing on her chippewa and german american heritage erdrich has produced a body of work whose pervasive mythical landscape and the cast of interconnected characters has been credited with bringing native american literature to the literary mainstream and inspiring an entire generation of native american writing her eleven north dakota novels constitute a web of complex absorbing narratives documenting familial political and social histories over a century of tumultuous change erdrich s blending of native oral and western traditions demand multilayered critical approaches the essays relate to different issues relevant to her fiction in particular the categorization of her work as native american but also questions about genre gender structure narrative voice authorship and the ethics and politics of fiction labeled as native american peter g beidler s essay for example investigates the use of medical terms as source of humor in four souls tom matchie in his essay explores parallels between use of grotesque in erdrich and flannery o connor alan r velie examines dialectics of the indian aesthetics and western literary forms in her fiction annette van dyke in her study of agnes damien s role in the last report shows how the reader s perspectives change with a change in agnes s role deborah l madsen and barbara hiles mesle explore erdrich s fiction from the perspective of trauma theory in the native american context harry j brown s essay on the function of naming in her fiction holly messitt in his comparative study of early american captivity narratives and erdrich s fiction david t mcnaab in his study of death and dying in her fiction all hint at the possibility of scholarship that erdrich s fiction can spawn

includes more than 360 interpretative essays on works of twentieth century fiction published in the united states and latin america

game provides limits boundaries and borders to play thereby both limiting and paradoxically enabling meaningful play this study does not claim that literature is a game in the strong sense it chooses instead to concentrate on the gamelike shape the gamefulness that literary postmodernism assumes
