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in understanding creativity authors john s dacey and kathleen h lennon offer a thorough examination of the three factors biological psychological and social that contribute to the creative process in clear and lively language this book explores a breadth of topics on creativity including how creative people operate as successful and imaginative problem solvers the essential role self control plays in realizing creative potential and the most current discoveries about how the brain works on the neuronal and chemical levels most important the book presents an innovative model that integrates the biological psychological and social elements and reflects the most significant advances in current creativity research

mary mcleod bethune was born on may 10 1875 in a log cabin in rural sumter county south carolina she was the fifteenth child among seventeen siblings but the first born free of the bonds of slavery as a child she attended a presbyterian mission school in nearby mayesville and scotia seminary in concord north carolina after some years at scotia she was admitted in 1894 to the moody bible institute in chicago her two years of training at moody did not lead to missionary work in africa as she had dreamed but to missionlike teaching positions in the south and eventually her founding in 1904 of the daytona normal and industrial institute for girls in daytona beach florida that institution would grow to the present day bethune cookman university in this religious

biography author yahya jongintaba traces bethune s life of service in lively prose structuring his book in a five part framework that organizes his subject s life in parallel with the lord s prayer and virtues identified by bethune herself freedom creativity integrity discipline and love with unfettered access to bethune s personal archive jongintaba paints a picture of a mother figure and mentor to generations a nearsaint who lived a blameless life for four score years with deep empathy and the kind of spiritual understanding that bethune had despaired of finding in a biographer in her own lifetime despite attempts by publishers and herself to find just the right person jongintaba endeavors to achieve in his biography what bethune wrote that she hoped to accomplish in an autobiography that never materialized to give to the world the real mary mcLeod bethune s life as i have lived it

creative environments is a follow up on the book creative space in the same series and by the same authors serving this time as editors of a broader book on computational intelligence and knowledge engineering tools for supporting knowledge creation this book contains four parts the first part presents a further development of models of knowledge creation presented already in creative space in particular the triple helix of normal academic knowledge creation and a new integrated model of normal academic and organizational knowledge creation called nanatsudaki seven waterfalls model the second part presents computational intelligence tools for knowledge acquisition by machine learning and data mining for debating brainstorming for roadmapping and for integrated support of academic creativity the third part presents the use of statistics for creativity support virtual laboratories gaming and role playing for creativity support methods of knowledge representation and multiple criteria aggregation distance and electronic learning the last part addresses knowledge management and philosophical issues and contains chapters on management of technology and knowledge management for academic r and d on knowledge management and creative holism or systems thinking in the knowledge age on technology and change or the role of technology in knowledge civilisation on the emergence of complex concepts in science and the final chapter on summary and conclusions including a proposal of an integrated episteme of constructive evolutionary objectivism necessary for the knowledge civilization age

this work first published in 1990 reissues the first thorough examination of the essentially masculine nature of max weber s social and political thinking through a detailed examination of his central texts the author demonstrates weber s masculine reading of social life and shows how his work advocates a masculine form of life that poses a challenge to contemporary women and to feminism in particular she addresses the patriarchal implications of weber s belief in the need to relegate the ethic of brotherly love to a private sphere in order to make possible rational action and the achievement of greatness in the public sphere

far from merely reinvigorating relativism postmodernism has detected and expressed in our time a powerful nihilating process of which truth and reality itself are the final casualties and with these morality and religion beginning from the theological reaches of philosophy this book argues that gods played a crucial part in modern philosophy even when it was most critical of them that the dominant nihilism of derrida is really an excessive and misleading outcome of a contemporary philosophy which could otherwise resonate with all that is best in our evolutionary image of the universe that moralists who turn to art in order to overcome the fact value version of this deadly dualism do not thereby rule out religion and that a christian theology which recognises the evolutionary and historical conditions of faith and revelation is once again producing a theology that builds upon the best of contemporary philosophy and science

the global reality of suffering and death has always demanded an authentic theological response and impelled debate concerning gods relationship to suffering as well as the conceivability of the suffering of god the scope and impact of this suffering in the last century have driven this debate to an acute pitch demanding to know how one can speak rightly of god in view of the suffering that is inherent and inflicted in the cosmos while in former ages some looked to an omnipotent and impassible deus ex machina in answer to this question many contemporary theologians have revised their understanding of god in relation to the world with these theologians gloria schaab proposes that a viable response to cosmic suffering is the recognition that the triune christian god participates in the very sufferings of the cosmos itself she sets her argument within theology and science dialogue and specifically within the work of scientist theologian arthur peacocke informed by the understandings of evolutionary science grounded within a panentheistic paradigm of the god world relationship and rooted within the christian theological tradition this work contends that the understanding of the triune god as intimately involved with the suffering of the cosmos is viable and efficacious in view of the suffering of the cosmos and its creatures it develops a female procreative model of the creative suffering of the triune god an ecological ethics based on the midwife model of care and a pastoral model of threefold differentiation of suffering in god as steps toward christian praxis in response to the mystery of god within the pain suffering and death of cosmic existence and human experience

this book assembles a wide variety of views on creativity its nature methods of teaching creativity problems and possibilities of teaching creativity in american education historical perspectives on creativity and suggestions for enhancing one s creativity through writing and through the study of literature cognitive science rhetoric and psychology it is an interdisciplinary study drawing on the diverse fields that make up the liberal arts and sciences to better understand the nature of the creative process and of the challenges faced by educators who would expand the creative powers of their students and of themselves the book also contains new ideas on the cognitive basis for creativity

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this book explores education for juvenile offenders in relation to passages academy which is both similar to and representative of many school programs in juvenile correctional facilities examining the mission and population of this school contributes to an understanding of the ways in which the teachers think about and ultimately act with respect to their detained juveniles students and particularly illustrates how the tension between punishment and rehabilitation is played out in school policies and design by calling attention to the decisions that surround juvenile detention
