this is a print on demand book and is therefore non returnable this book represents the only comprehensive attempt made thus far to survey all the efforts among christians and jews from new testament times onward to translate the new testament and the christian liturgy into hebrew whether the translators were intended to convert the jews or to equip them with information necessary for the discussion of religion with christians they served to promote conversation and overcome divisions the author's intimate knowledge of not only biblical but also mishnaic and modern hebrew has enabled him to appreciate the various efforts at translation with acute sensitivity thus the book is virtually a catalog of successes and failures in mutual understanding more than the mere data of history hebrew in the church is a penetrating contribution to the entire history of jewish christian relations it sheds fresh light on history itself and it suggests important implications for anyone concerned with the exegesis of the new testament this unprecedented volume should receive the serious attention not only of specialists but of all who work for a new understanding between christians and jews

sacred dissonance is a thought provoking study exploring the distinctions between religious identities and cultural boundaries of jews and christians opposing the notion that all faiths are the same anthony le donne a new testament scholar and larry behrendt a jewish lawyer offer introspective essays on topics such as neighborhood relations hospitality and the holocaust and provide a model for addressing a difficult past and challenging present

this book inquires as to whether theological dialogue between christians and jews is possible not only in itself but also as regards the emergence of communities of messianic judaism in light of david novak s insights matthew leveraging proposes that christian theological responses to supersessionism need to preserve both the church s development of doctrine and rabbinic judaism s ability to define its own boundaries the book undertakes constructive philosophical theology in dialogue with novak exploring the interrelated doctrines of divine providence theonomy the image of god and natural law leveraging places novak s work in conversation especially with thomas aquinas whose approach fosters a rich dialogue with novak s broadly maimonidean perspective it focuses upon the relationship of human beings to the creator with attention to the philosophical entailments of jewish and christian covenantal commitments aiming to spell out what true freedom involves it concludes by asking whether christians and jews would do better to bracket our covenantal commitments in pursuing such wisdom drawing upon novak s work the author argues that in the face of suffering and death god s covenantal election makes possible hope lacking which the quest for wisdom runs aground

this volume sheds light on the transformed post holocaust relationship between catholics and jews once implacable theological foes the two traditions have travelled a great distance in coming to view the other with respect and dignity responding to the horrors of auschwitz the catholic church has undergone a reckoning of the soul beginning with its landmark document nostra aetate and embraced a positive theology of judaism including the ongoing validity of the jewish covenant jews have responded to this unprecedented outreach especially in the document dabru emet together these two abrahamic traditions have begun seeking a repair of the world the road has been rocky and certainly obstacles remain nevertheless authentic interfaith dialogue remains a new and promising development in the search for a peace

asserts that three preconditions have produced an imbalance and created difficulties in conducting christian jewish dialogue since 1967 that christians should renounce antisemitism abstain from proselytizing among jews and recognize israel s right to exist within the boundaries accepted by the un discusses rosemary ruether s thesis that christian anti judaism implies the concept of antisemitism arguing that the intention to eradicate the roots of antisemitism from the new testament could shake the foundations of christian teaching and produce a relativization of christianity states that some passages of the new testament are anti judaic only with respect to jesus contemporaries and are not inherently anti jewish ch 8 pp 293 305 discusses the

holocaust from a christian theological perspective considering it absolutely inhuman anti biblical and anti christian concludes that all forms of antisemitism including the holocaust are a rejection of the biblical concept of god of man and of judeo christian ethics

the five sections of the book are entitled christian attitudes to judaism and the jews jewish attitudes to the dialogue the vatican and the jews israel in the dialogue the dialogue in israel ch 3 discusses the nostra aetate declaration 1965 the churches undertook the revision of many religious teachings in order to eliminate the traditional antisemitic stereotype of the jews not enough however is being done in either jewish or christian education to build up understanding of the values and beliefs of the other the appendix pp 143 167 contains documents statements by the vatican nostra aetate the guidelines the notes and the world council of churches
